New Release: Critical Gaps in AOT Research



We know, based on research, that assisted outpatient treatment orders lead to better outcomes. However, because the implementation of AOT can differ widely from community to community, we do not know what AOT practices garner the best results. Is it the court order? Is it the black robe effect? Is it a treatment team that goes above and beyond? Is it a combination of factors? Without more research, we can only speculate based on what we see and hear from those who are engaged in this work on a daily basis.

Treatment Advocacy Center and Northeast Ohio Medical University recently partnered to highlight this gap in knowledge and to call on research institutions, funders and publishers to further investigate the practice of AOT so that those of us working in this area can use this information to identify best practices and maximize the effectiveness of AOT programs

When asked about their recovery goals, many AOT participants mention wanting to work. Employment can play a significant role in recovery. In addition to confidence, relationship-building, and increased independence, some AOT participants make a connection between gaining and maintaining employment and treatment adherence.

Maryland Passes AOT Law!

For over 25 years, TAC has led a nationwide movement to eliminate barriers to the treatment of severe mental illness. Much of that work included advocacy to reform state laws to make it possible to treat people before illness caused them to fall into homelessness, incarceration, or become a danger to themselves or others.

These efforts have contributed to all but three states adopting statutes that allow for the use of AOT. As of last month, that number will decrease to just two states without AOT laws, Massachusetts and Connecticut. We are pleased to share that after many, many years of hard work, advocates in Maryland have helped to pass legislation that will require counties to implement AOT.
